

Points to note Before tooth removal

Before tooth removal, Kindly Inform your Doctor If you are ,...

- **1** Suffering from any illness
- 2 Taking any medicines
- 3 Allergic to any medicines



Dental extraction is almost a painless procedure as it is done under ocal anaesthesia.

If any pain if felt during the procedure, it may be because, the tooth is infected at the root tip.

Thus, the procedure can be continued only after taking medications prescribed by the doctor.

Proper food should be taken before tooth removal.

Care after Tooth removal



Bite gently, but firmly on the COTTON GAUZE. This will control bleeding. Remove it after the bleeding has stopped.



Placing an ICE-PACK
On the cheek will reduce bleeding and swelling.



& HARD FOOD.

Do not use STRAW for drinking



SOFT, COLD FOOD

Gargle mildly with
LUKE WARM SALT
WATER
8 hours after tooth
removal.
Do so 3 times daily
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NO SMOKING, NO ALCOHOL After tooth removal and during medication.



Take the prescribed MEDICINES at the right time.




If there is a SUTURE at the site of tooth removal, your Doctor will remove it at the next appointment.

consult your Doctor if there is ,...

Severe pain, after the day of tooth removal.

Uncontrolled bleeding or swelling.

Rashes, itching, swelling or redness of the eyes, after taking medicines.



Impacted Teeth

In this condition, the majority of the tooth portion remains embedded (impacted) in the jaw bone.

Removal of this tooth, requires much care & effort than a normal tooth removal.


Which teeth are most often Impacted?

Wisdom tooth or Third molar




They are the most commonest impacted tooth.



Orthognathic Surgery for correction of facial deformities

Orthognathic surgery, or corrective jaw surgery is performed by an oral and maxillofacial surgeon.

The aim is to correct,... skeletal and dental irregularities, including the misalignment of jaws and teeth.

Orthognathic surgery, improves the overall aesthetic appearance and functions like chewing, speaking and breathing.









How does a baby get a cleft lip/palate?

Cleft lip and cleft palate occur very early in pregnancy, while the baby is developing inside the mother.

Clefting results when there is not enough tissue in the mouth or lip area, and the remaining tissue does not ion together.

Complications depending on the type and severity of the cleft.

- Difficulty in foeding.
- Ear infections and hearing loss.
- Dental problems.
- Speech difficulties:
- **Emotional** and behavioral problems due to differences in physical appearance

Factors that are responsible for the occurrence of a cleft lip/palate.

- Parents with a family history of cleft lip or palate face a higher risk of having a baby with a cleft.
- In pregnant women who smoke cigarettes, drink alcohol or take certain medications.
- Having diabetes during pregnancy.

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Cleft lip and palate can be surgically corrected!

- The aim of surgical treatment is to improve the child's ability to eat, speak and hear normally and to achieve a normal facial appearance.
- Surgery often involves a team of Doctors and experts.
- Surgeries are performed in this order:
 Within the first 15 months of age Cleft lip repair is done.
 By the age of 15 months Cleft palate repair is done.
 Between age 2 and the teen years Follow-up surgeries are done.
- The surgery takes place in a hospital and is done under general anesthesia, so the child won't feel any pain during or after surgery.
